




Although we were unable to invite family members into school again this year, we ensured that the children had a range of opportunities to enjoy and celebrate the magic of the season.

Art Project

On Friday 3rd December, we officially announced to our children that an exciting art project was being undertaken with the aim of producing work for school, which would represent our school community.

Leanne Billinghurst, who is a parent of children at Harlow Green but also a professional artist, had discussed with Mr Malik the possibility of volunteering to paint portraits of some of our children which could then be presented in school. After some discussion about how brilliant this could be, it was decided that Leanne could paint the portrait of an individual child from each of our year groups which, when finished, would be displayed as a gallery in our main entrance.

During an afternoon, each class had the fantastic opportunity to come into the hall and spend time with Leanne where they heard about the artistic process, saw some of the portraits so far and were able to ask questions to find out more. However, the most amazing aspect was that they were all able to see Leanne paint in real-time! It is not very often that you would get a chance to see a professional artist paint in real life, so the children were suitably excited. One of Year 6 children stated that this was 'a privilege' whilst a Year 1 pupil said that they wanted to be a professional artist themselves.

Nursery – Dentist Visit



The children in Nursery have enjoyed learning about hygiene, the importance of staying clean, and how we can all do this. This discussion was supported by the story, 'Whiffy Wilson'.

Nursery has particularly been looking at oral hygiene, which the children have enjoyed acting out in our dentist role-play area. Everyone has looked at the different tools a dentist would use and the uniform they wear (to stay protected). The highlight was a visit from Julie, a local dentist. Julie came and spoke to the children about brushing their teeth and how to do it correctly. The children liked teaching Julie our toothbrushing song to remind us to clean our gums and tongue.

Reception – One Kind Word



During Anti-bullying week, Reception joined in to kick off the week with the 'Odd Socks Day' campaign. This highlights the importance of being unique and that regardless of our differences, difficulties and disabilities, everyone needs to be treated equally! The children learned about bullying and what this means, during assembly. The children now know that if they are having yucky feelings or feel like someone is upsetting them, then they come to a trusted adult who will try and help.

Reception have read the story 'Rainbow Fish' as part of their literacy work. The story follows the journey of a fish and how he starts sharing his shimmering scales to make friends with the other fish through an act of kindness. The children used the concept of this year's theme – One Kind Word – to share kind words across Reception and spread smiles! The boys and girls also created their own rainbow fish in the junk modelling area using various cut and stick materials and made their own kindness crowns to wear during the day to promote kindness to friends and teachers.

During Year 1's Geography sessions, the classes have been focusing on where they live. Some children said that they lived in Gateshead whilst others were able to say their address. The children learned that we all live in a country called England, found it on a globe and realised that England is part of the United Kingdom. Independently, everyone coloured in the country of England on a map and labelled it.

In DT, Year 2 designed and built a toy fire engine. As part of their research, the children learned about an inventor called George William Manby who is famous for inventing the first fire extinguisher. They also looked at different toy fire engines and decided which they liked the best and why.

When designing their moving vehicle, the boys and girls learned that the base of a vehicle is called a 'chassis' and for the wheels to turn, they need to be attached to an 'axle'. They also had to design a winding mechanism to include in their final design.

When it came to making their toy fire engine, the children began by wrapping their cardboard box in red paper. Next, the children created their winding mechanism. The children had lots of fun testing whether this part of their product worked effectively.

Year 3 – The Sacrament of Baptism



This half term, Year 3 have been learning about Christianity. The boys and girls learned about John the Baptist and were able to retell his story using visual prompts. As John the Baptist told people to repent their sins, the children wrote about something they wanted to say sorry for. These were written on raindrops to symbolise the importance of water to the lives of Christians.

The children have also been learning about Baptism. They watched a video to understand what happens during a Baptism ceremony and they created their own sacrament symbol for Baptism. Within these symbols, the children drew images of objects or symbols they had seen used during the Baptism ceremony.

Year 4 – How Do Artists Use Pencils?



For their Art topic this term, Year 4 started by looking at the ways in which artists use pencils to create realistic drawings. Mark-making is the foundation to this, and the children have been learning about all the different ways pencils can be used to mark, shade, blend and sketch. The boys and girls were then able to look at how sketches are made more realistic through detail which was then applied by everyone drawing their own feathers, branches, rocks and even onions!

Year 5 – Vector Drawing



Year 5 have been studying vector drawing in Computing. To do this, the classes used drawing tools within PowerPoint. Firstly, the children were introduced to vector drawings and began to develop an understanding that they are made up of simple shapes and lines. Following this, each class discussed how vector drawings differ from paper-based ones. Next, everyone was given the opportunity to experiment with shape and line tools to create a picture. The children loved adding colour and texture to their drawings and produced some excellent results ranging from houses to mice!

Year 6 – Rock Around the Clock

This term, Year 6 have been studying World War Two. As part of this, in PE lessons, the children have been learning different types of dances that came about during wartime. They have enjoyed practising the Jive to the song *Rock Around the Clock*, by Bill Haley – a song that they have also been learning to sing as part of their singing assemblies. It has been fantastic to see their impressive dance moves including 'Funny Feet' and 'The Elvis'!
