Nursery – Autumn Treasure Hunt



Nursery children have thoroughly enjoyed exploring the outside area to find Autumn treasures such as pinecones, conkers, acorns, and different coloured leaves. Unfortunately, Nursery did not see any real-life squirrels, but they did see some real-life chickens and even a real fire in our firepit!

As part of Reception's 'Marvellous Me' topic, the children have been looking at their families. Children discussed how everyone's families are different, making us all unique. Reception learned that it doesn't matter if you have a different family to someone else, or if you have two homes or if you don't have brothers and sisters, because our family is what makes us, us!

The children enjoyed sharing their photos of their families from Tapestry and talking about them with their friends. Everyone spent time making their own special photo frames to add family pictures to.

This half term, Year 1 are working on gymnastic techniques and skills – starting with balancing using different parts of their body. The children tried to form squares, circles and triangles using parts of their body. Some of the children were extremely creative and made shapes using arms, legs and even their backs. Next, Year 1 held each shape balance for five seconds and then created sequences linking three shape balances together. Children worked with a partner to create a sequence of actions that they then demonstrated to the class.

In Computing, Year 2 have been learning all about Information Technology (IT). They know that information technology is a computer or something that works with a computer. Over the last few weeks, the children have been identifying examples of IT in school, at home and in the wider world.

The children have been exploring how helpful IT is. They pretended to be a barcode scanner and till. Working together, they used the barcode to identify the product, found the price and then wrote it down. Although this was a lot of fun, they realised that using technology makes this process a lot quicker!

Year 3 – Exhilarating Egyptians



Year 3's history topic, this term, has been the Ancient Egyptians. The children have thoroughly enjoyed learning about this period of history and the importance of the Nile River to this civilisation. All of the children enjoyed creating a model shaduf which would have been used to take water out of the Nile River to water crops thousands of years ago!

Mummification proved to be a very popular topic and the children created excellent recounts of the process. They were fascinated to hear that the brain was removed through the nose!

The children also enjoyed learning about the Pharaoh, Tutankhamun, and the discovery of his tomb. They were amazed at the treasures that were found in the tomb and understood that this was why he is remembered today. They even went on to create their own death masks like the one found on Tutankhamun!

Year 4 – How 'Viking' Are We?



In History, Year 4 are studying the Vikings and have looked at how they influenced where we live and how we live today. The children started with the chronology of when the Viking raids took place. Then they looked at houses, lifestyle, work and place names locally – identifying those that are of Viking origin. Did you know that towns and villages with names ending in -thorpe, -ness, -by and -kirk are all likely to have their origins in Viking heritage?

The children have also been looking at how the Viking way of life differed from ours – from clothes to houses and from food to work. In the end, the vast majority decided that we prefer our modern times since there were no mobile telephones or games consoles in Viking England!

Year 5 – Internet Safety

In PSHE, Year 5 children are learning all about relationships. Children have looked at the word 'anonymous' and how anonymity can be used to hide information about ourselves online. Year Five were given an example profile of a child, similar to their own age, and they had the task of highlighting information which shouldn't have been shared online, such as address, school, and age. They discussed the dangers that might come from sharing this information.

Year Five will be continuing the topic of safety this term and how this relates to the wider world.

Year 6 – Maths Morning

Year 6 children had the opportunity to work with their parents this half term during a morning dedicated to maths. It was brilliant to see the competition between children and parents in times table dominoes and factors and multiples games – with the children definitely proving the winners!

The aim of the morning was to demonstrate the importance of knowing basic number facts and having quick recall of times tables. Thank you to all the parents who made the morning such a success by joining in to support the children.
