Angel of North- 25th Anniversary



On the 15 February 1998, Harlow Green pupils and staff noticed the arrival of a new neighbour who changed the landscape and views forever. 208 tonnes of steel, 20 metres high and seen by an estimated 30 million people each year, Athony Gormley's Angel is now recognised around the world as one of the most important pieces of public art. This year marks the Angel's 25th birthday.

To celebrate, the school have received two knitted Angels of the North. The Angels will be taking part in school visits and activities with the children over the next few months. Some children have also been invited to join in the birthday celebrations on Wednesday 15th February. Nursery – A Dino Discovery!



Nursery children discovered a dinosaur egg in the classroom this half term! This led to the children discussing what a dinosaur is, what they already know about dinosaurs and learning the names and simple facts about other dinosaurs. Later, the children learned about the life cycle of a dinosaur and made up their own movements to represent the life cycle such as curling up in a ball like an egg and jumping and shaking to show the egg hatching. A favourite part of the week was taking part in dinosaur dancing and yoga.

Reception – Chinese New Year



The children have been learning about the celebration of 'Chinese New Year'. During sessions, the children tried Chinese dancing and talked about how Chinese New Year is celebrated – dragon dances, making lanterns and giving money in red envelopes. It was hugely exciting when the boys and girls created their own dragon and made a dragon dance! A favourite part of the week was the food tasting with chopsticks during which the children tried noodles, spring rolls, prawn crackers, soy sauce and sweet chill! Kung Hei Fat Choi!

Year 1 have been hugely excited to use the laptops this term. It all started with the children learning the different parts of a computer – screen, keyboard, trackpad and mouse. Next, the children were given individual log-ins and, even though it was tricky, everyone was able to successfully login. Later, the children focused on controlling the trackpad. The teachers then asked the children to make a picture on a paint program. They had to concentrate very carefully to control the trackpad with one hand and click the button to paint with the other hand. The children created some very impressive paintings of houses and showed fantastic determination when controlling the trackpad. Year 1 are becoming technological whizz kids!

Year 2 had two special visitors this half term from Newcastle Central Mosque to teach the children all about life as a Muslim.

Firstly, the children learned about how the birth of a baby is celebrated by Muslims. They learned that the first words a Muslim baby ever hears is the call to prayer and it is whispered into the baby's right ear as soon as they are born. They also found out that seven days after the baby is born its hair is shaved and weighed. The family then donate the weight of the hair in gold to charity. This is called the Aqeeqah.

Did you know that Muslims try to pray five times a day? The children learned about how Muslims wash before they pray and pray on special prayer mats. Year 2 also got to see the Muslim holy book called the Koran and they found out that, because it is written in Arabic, it is read from right to left.

Year 3 – Stone Age to Iron Age



In History, Year 3 have been learning about life through the ages. First, children learned about the Stone Age and investigated artefacts from this time. Year 3 then became archaeologists and, using images, discussed what the artefacts would have been used for and what they were made out of.

Next, the children learned about life during the Stone Age and wrote a diary entry imagining they were a child during this time who would hunt for food and make tools using flint. After this, the boys and girls learned about how life changed during the Bronze Age and the Iron Age because people developed skills in farming and trading.

Finally, the children investigated changes in homes during the ages and identified that people, who were nomads during the Stone Age living in temporary homes, were living in communities within hillforts during the Iron Age.

Year 4 – Introducing Short Division



This term, in maths sessions, children were introduced to a number of new concepts, starting with more formal methods of short division, then developing their knowledge of fractions and decimals. In lessons, children have been using counters to look at division with remainders. Dividing 5 by 2, we split our counters into groups of 2 then looked to see if there were any remainders. Using their times table knowledge, the children knew there would be some remainders because 5 is not a multiple of 2.

As the children built their confidence, they moved away from using concrete apparatus to visual models and then completing calculations mentally or using written methods.

Year 5 – Fantastic Fencing

This half term, Class 5A have been participating in some rather interesting PE lessons! After finding out that they would be taking part in fencing lessons, the children were very excited. Lesson 1 focused on the basics of fencing, including learning about the salute, the 'on guard' position, the rules for moving and also the importance of defending.

Once everyone knew the basics, the children were introduced to the foil and even got to play matches within their teams. They all performed the salute before the match began and correctly moved forwards and backwards away from their opponent, all whilst defending themselves against a 'touch'. The referees for each match had to keep a close eye on which opponent made the first touch and had the difficult decision of deciding which foil was most curved if both opponents scored a touch at the same time.

Year 6 – Mental Health Matters



During PSHE lessons, Year 6 have been discussing the importance of mental health and ensuring that they are aware of how to keep mentally healthy and also how to ask for help if they feel that they need it. They have come up with many ways to help promote a healthy mindset and have produced posters to represent these ideas. They have also been introduced to the Young Minds website, which has various activities and sections to help young people in different situations.
