Nursery – Farms

This term, Nursery have focused on farms and new life. The children have learned about the jobs of people who live on the farm, recapped the names of baby farm animals and discovered how farm animals help us in various way, for example, how the milk from cows and goats can be used to make butter, cheese and yogurt. In the creative area, lots of children have also created different farm animals such as chickens, pigs and cows using paper plates, tissue paper, paint, and glue. All children have enjoyed practising singing 'Old McDonald had a farm' and 'Bah, Bah, Black Sheep''.



For Mother's Day, Reception children had the opportunity to make cards. The children began by reading 'My Mum is fantastic' and discussed how their own mam, or people who care for them, are fantastic too. The children then practiced their fine motor skills by sewing thread onto a paper heart, ready to put onto card. Some of the children found this quite tricky but tried very hard. Finally, the children used their phonics to write a message inside the card. The children enjoyed sewing and were very excited to give their mam's or special person their special card.

Year 1 – Let's Build a House



This half term, Year One were introduced to their new English text – a non-fiction book called 'Let's Build a House'. To launch this new book children went outside to collect natural materials. Once Year One collected the natural materials, they worked with their partner to build a house. The children had to include walls, a roof, windows and a door. Some children even adorned their house with a beautiful garden or a practical garage. The children ware very creative with how they chose to use their different materials.

During History lessons, Year 2 have been learning about the English monarchs, Henry VIII and Elizabeth II. To begin, the children learned all about King Henry's family tree. Year 2 learned that Henry VIII was never meant to be king. His older brother Arthur died in battle, so Henry became the next king of England. Next, the children learned that Henry had six wives. However, he wasn't always a very nice husband. A fact file for each wife was created to show how their marriage to Henry ended. The boys and girls learned a rhyme to help them remember – divorced, beheaded, died, divorced, beheaded, survived. Year 2 couldn't believe that Henry was allowed to chop off their heads!

The children also completed a family tree for Elizabeth II. They learned that she had four children – King Charles III, Princess Anne, Prince Andrew, and Prince Edward. Then, the boys and girls found out what happened at Elizabeth's coronation. Did you know a coronation is a special ceremony when a monarch is crowned?

The children are very interested in King Charles III's upcoming coronation and are looking forward to spotting some of the things they saw on the video of Elizabeth II's coronation.

Year 3 – Local Area Study



During Year 3's Geography work this term, children have been learning about our local area. Firstly, they researched rural and urban areas to identify the differences in locations. In order to investigate how Harlow Green has changed over time, the children studied a range of historical maps of the area. They were fascinated as they discovered how the land use has changed and they were able to identify that Harlow Green used to be mainly rural land with pit mines located nearby.

To investigate the local area nowadays, Year 3 went on a walk and carried out fieldwork linked to land use. They have then used this information to create sketch maps of the area which has allowed them to identify areas that are used for residential, community, retail, and recreational purposes.

Year 4 – Kestrels and the Mice



Over the term, children in Year 4 have been learning about birds. They have been looking at the feeding habits of birds of prey. To try and help the children understand the sheer speed of these birds and what it might feel like to be their prey, Year 4 have been playing a game of 'Kestrels and the Mice'. Imagine you are a small mouse, spotted by a bird that can go from 0 to 50kmph in 3 seconds. What are you going to do? As the game progresses each round gives the 'mice' less time to hide, starting with 5 seconds and ending up on 1 second. This is to indicate the diving times of the hawk, from hovering to full attack. The game moves through different habitats ending up in woodland. The children soon realised that they can't go far, being small and very still is their only option, particularly on open ground.

Year 5 – Fantastic Filming Techniques



Over the last few weeks, children in Year 5 have been investigating different filming techniques and camera positions. Firstly, the children practiced using a closeup, middle and long shot, as well as a side-by-side shot and moving object shot. Next, the children were introduced to the 'fixed camera' position, meaning they had to keep the camera still whilst filming.

Children worked in pairs to apply different filming techniques (such as long shot, closeup and zoom), whilst their partner read from a script. Year 5 discussed how the audio is affected the further away the speaker is from the filming device. They then evaluated which shot would be best in certain scenarios and will be applying this knowledge when they begin to create their own video!

Year 6 – USA Cooking



As part of their DT work, the Year 6 children enjoyed working with Chef Nick. The children worked in groups to help to prepare and cook dishes with an American theme – jambalaya and gumbo. The chef shared information about life in America, typical American foods, and healthy eating. Although lots of them were not healthy, it was interesting to learn about some American dishes. The children used knives to cut and dice food for the dishes and there were some excellent choppers. At the end, all of the children got a chance to taste the dishes; there were some very happy diners! Hopefully, the skills the children learned will help them to cook their families, in the near future.
