Nursery – Nursery Get Busy in the Forest School



At the beginning of term, Nursery children were given an important task, they had to sow some wildflower seeds in an area outside Nursery classroom. The children have been eagerly checking to see if the wildflowers have started to sprout. At this stage, it is difficult to see which are flowers and which are weeds, but nothing goes to waste as they'll pick the weeds out and give them to the hens. The children were excited to see how quickly the plants had grown. That rain dance really helped!

Reception – BEEautiful Buzzy Bees



In Forest School this term, Reception have been learning about Spikes and Stings and Sticky things. This encompasses slightly riskier plants (stinging nettles, brambles, thistles etc.), insects that may cause harm if provoked (bees, wasps, the occasional earwig), and stick safety (how we move and handle natural materials).

Reception read a story about bees and looked at bees' fuzzy little bodies to see how this helps them collect pollen. The children learned about the dance of the bees and even tried out some moves of their own. Outside, they created their own bees which they could then fly off with to see how many flowers they could find, visiting each one in turn. Phew, it's surprisingly tiring visiting every dandelion you see!

Year 1 – "We're all going on a summer holiday."



This term, the topic within Year 1 is "We're all going on a summer holiday." The children have enjoyed talking about their trips to the seaside, how they like building sandcastles on the beach, and the enjoyment of eating fish and chips. The children have also had the opportunity to learn about seaside holidays during the Victorian times. Year 1 learned that families travelled to the seaside by train, enjoyed watching Punch and Judy shows on the beach and even had donkey rides. The children had the chance to make a bathing hut which, in Victorian times, people used to get changed in when at the beach.

Year 2 have been learning about statistics in Maths this half term. First, they learnt about tally marks and how they can be used to help count objects. They practised reading different tally marks and making them themselves. Then they were ready to put their knowledge into practise and make tally charts themselves.

Next, Year 2 learnt about tables. They found out that it is much easier to read the data in a table than in a tally chart. They were then able to use this data to answer different types of questions including adding up and comparing different groups within the data set. Why not try this at home and count the different coloured cars you see on the way to school?

Year 3 – Marvellous Map Work



In geography work this term, Year 3 have been developing their map reading skills. Initially, the children recapped the countries found within the United Kingdom and they learnt that they live in the county of Tyne and Wear.

All of the children have enjoyed using atlases to explore the United Kingdom, to locate cities and rivers and then add these to their own maps. The children have also identified how Newcastle-upon-Tyne has changed over time, using historical maps and graphs to discuss changes to land use and population.

Year 4 – Greek Myths



This term in Year 4, children have been learning all about Ancient Greek myths, in their English lessons. The children have read and listened to lots of different Greek myths including Perseus and Medusa, Theseus and the Minotaur and Jason and the Golden Fleece. The children have enjoyed learning all about the different monsters in the story and how the heroes defeated them!

In preparation to write their own Greek myths, Year 4 designed their very own hero, villain, and creature. The children came up with back stories for their characters (e.g. why they are now a villain/hero/creature) and began to describe them. Everyone showed their creativity skills especially with designing the creatures, which they made by combining different animals together!

Year 5 – Inspiring Islamic Art



Year 5 have begun to look at Islamic art, during their art lessons this half term. Children have looked at examples of Islamic art to identify the three main components: floral motifs, geometric patterns, and calligraphy. Next, they were given different examples of Islamic art to choose from and were asked to write a short description of what each artwork consisted of.

Lots of children identified the use of symmetry in the designs and the use of different sized lines to create unique shapes. Following on from this, Year Five were given an example of geometric Islamic art to colour in using only three colours as children identified that artists were limited in their use of colour due to ink being extremely difficult to find during the Ancient Islamic civilisation!
