Nursery – 'Tis the Season to Sparkle!

Children have been making Christmas cards using different lengths of card, sequins, and glitter. Nursery worked hard to write their own names giving meanings to our marks. Everyone also made magic reindeer dust to sprinkle on Christmas Eve to guide the reindeers to our house.

The children have been incredibly busy rehearsing for the Nativity performance for weeks, and the day finally arrived where they enjoyed performing in front of a huge audience filled with parents and Grandparents. Smiles filled the hall as they sang their hearts out to the many songs they have been learning over the last few weeks.

Year 1 – The Christmas Story



Year 1 have been busy rehearsing their Christmas Nativity. Alongside this, they have also been learning about the Christian story of Christmas. Firstly, the children learnt the names of all the important characters – Mary, Joseph, Jesus and the Angel Gabriel. Next, they learnt all about the events leading up to the birth of Jesus. Each child drew a nativity scene, and some labelled the characters.

Year 2 – When I grow up I want to be...



Year 2 have been thinking about goals and aspirations this half term. Children started by identifying that an aspiration is a wider general achievement, whereas a goal is a smaller step towards that achievement. The children then thought carefully about what their goals are. Firstly, they talked about their short-term goals such as achieving 5 out of 5 on their spelling test. Next, the children thought about longer-term goals such as what they want to achieve next year or when they are adults. Finally, the children thought about what careers they are interested in and identified what they want to be when they grow up.

Year 3 – Comparing Coasts



In Geography, Year 3 have been learning about coastlines and water erosion. The children have learned about the features of a coast and have enjoyed looking at aerial images on Google Earth to identify these features. Year 3 explored coastlines in the United Kingdom, in particular coasts close to us and compared this to coasts in Egypt. The classes discussed their similarities and differences, understanding that some coastlines are flat and some coastlines have cliffs. While looking at time-lapse videos, the children were able to make observations on how coastlines change over time, through human intervention and natural causes.

The learning in Geography has sparked a lot of interest for the children to learn more about physical and human geography.

This term in Computing, Year 4 have been learning about how to edit images and how the media can alter an image so that what we see online and in newspapers and magazines is often not what it originally was!

Using Paint.net, children have been learning to crop an image, alter the colours and mood of a picture, clone it to edit out parts of it and also to cut and paste between pictures. It is always a really interesting part of the Computing curriculum and includes all sorts of other computer skills such as editing, saving, cutting and pasting.

Article 17: We have the right to safe and honest information.





The children in Year 5 spent some time designing their own posters for the 2024 RE calendar, which is hung in each class throughout school. Year 5 created posters representing two different Sikh festivals, Hola Mohalla and Guru Nanak's birthday. The children enjoyed using their creative skills and imaginations to add to their designs and found it interesting learning about the different ways people celebrate across the world.

Article 29: We all have the right to develop our own talents and abilities.



Over this half-term, the children have continued to study the short visual and musical narrative, 'The Piano'. This animation has allowed the children to think about how a flashback narrative would be constructed as the story involves a man playing the piano and drifting back to memories from his past life.

The children looked at different sentences that would be suitable in different parts of the story and worked hard to be emotive and descriptive to bring alive the man's memories. When writing, the children wrote in first person, and this allowed them to make the narrative really personal. It was pleasing to see how the children could use their inference skills to develop a relevant back-story for each of the events and give details that weren't apparent in the animation itself.
